Adobe CS2

So what's all the fuss about the new Adobe CS Suite? Can another upgrade really contain all that much more than the previous upgrade you've shelled out all your hard earned cash for?

The answer is yes and no, depending on what product you tend to be using in the Adobe Suite. Technically you don't need any Adobe product to run a multimedia course. You can do most of the same things in Photoshop in other programs like Macromedia Fireworks. However, now that Adobe has bought Macromedia, the days of Fireworks may soon be over. It's hard to see how Adobe can justify two photo manipulation packages.

However, there are some exciting features in the new version of photoshop. One of them is smart objects, a kind of memory system for making changes to images and using those changes even when you swap the original image for a different one. Photoshop remembers all the filters, effects and changes you've made and promptly does the same thing to the new inserted image. Not only that but there is even more integration between Illustrator and Photoshop. Changes made in Illustrator are automatically updated in Photoshop.

There is also a great new 3D feature in Illustrator. If you're like me and love playing around and drawing in illustrator, the 3D object can be used on shapes or type. I've found that my students enjoy using 3D options to make business cards so that their name stands out from the illustration.

Another great feature in Illustrator is the Live Trace option. This is similar to the trace bitmap option in Flash. You can import a bitmap or scan in a drawing and then use the live trace option to create a cartoon image of the bitmap. You can change the color properties to greyscale, black and white and color. I've used this feature when I've created interactive comics.

Lastly, there is a new feature called Ado-

be Bridge which gives you access to a range of templates and organises your files into thumbnail selections. This makes it easier to locate images and flick between several versions of a particular design.

Overall I believe this Adobe upgrade is well worth the money. The educational package contains everything that the professional version does at a fraction of the price. Also, InDesign is bundled in with the pack. Whilst you don't need InDesign to teach VET, its a great tool to make newsletters and online magazines and you could also use the templates to get students to make a magazine for the Content/Copy Module.

Committee Members Corner

Each quarter Pixeled will highlight a member of the pixeled committee and give you some background as to who is helping to run our organisation. This month an interview with Susan Bell - Multimedia Teacher at Wesley College, St Kilda Road Campus.

Q: How did you become involved with the teaching of Multimedia?

A: I did a course in multimedia back in the 1990's but at the time didn't think I'd ever be a teacher. Mostly I thought I'd get a job working as a content/copy writer for a web design company but before I finished the course the industry went belly up and all the dot.coms fizzled. I retrained as a teacher and got the job at Wesley three years ago.

Q: How did you become involved in Pixeled?

A: It became pretty obvious the first year I started teaching multimedia that there weren't a lot of resources available and very little direction on how to structure the VET course. I met Rachelle (president of Pixeled) at a PD session and I'd already met Ana at a VCAA day the year before. Then I met Geoff, Claire and Marian and we all clicked and decided to start Pixeled to help other multimedia teachers.

Q: Where do you see the subject of multimedia heading over the next 5 years?

A: I can definitely see it becoming combined with the IT VET subject as more students appear to be turning to multimedia and away from the traditional IT learning area of databases and organisational structures of IPM or Information Systems.

Q: What have you found to be the greatest challenges facing Multimedia Teachers?

A: The course is still in the early stages within high schools and there is definitely a huge discrepancy between the training hours available to TAFE and to high schools. It is hard to get through the course and prepare students for the exam when we get half the hours that TAFE does to deliver the course.

Q: What resources have you found useful in the teaching of Multimedia?

A: Online tutorials, lots of books on design and using all the software applications. The best way to learn is to play around with the software and network with other teachers.

Q: What role do you play in Pixeled?

A: I'm the secretary so I'm responsible for taking minutes, organising the bookings, sending information to teachers, responding to queries, maintaining the web site and helping to deliver the professional development sessions. It's a lot of work and I do it in my spare time but I feel I've gained a lot from knowing the other committee members and I've enjoyed the role.
