Keynote Speakers



Professor David Hopkins HSBC iNet Chair of International Leadership

Professor Hopkins supports the work of iNet and the Leadership Centre at the Institute of Education, University of London. He has also been appointed a Professorial Fellow at the Faculty of Education, University of Melbourne.

Between 2002 and 2005 he served three Secretary of States as the Chief Adviser on School Standards at the Department for Education and Skills (UK). Previously, he was Chair of the Leicester City Partnership Board and Professor of Education, Head of the School, and Dean of the Faculty of Education at the University of Nottingham. Before that again he was a tutor at the University of Cambridge Institute of Education, a Secondary School teacher and Outward Bound Instructor.



Tony Cruttenden Head of ICLT, The Knox School

Tony Cruttenden is a teacher and a consultant to schools. He is respected internationally for his presentations on Models for Learning Technology at conferences in Sydney, Melbourne, Paris, London and Nice.

Tony is currently Head of ICLT at The Knox School in Victoria. However, his prior experience is extensive having involved him in a number of major projects including:

- Design of the first school purpose built for on-line curriculum delivery and notebook computers, in Toulouse, France, for British Aerospace/Airbus. This \$45million project established a new pedagogical model for curriculum delivery in a multinational, bi-lingual context
- Design and launch of the Learning Technology programme for Claremont Fan Court School in Surrey, England. This project created a great deal of interest with its "thinking curriculum" approach to the National Curriculum.



Dr Michelle Selinger Director, Education – Asia Pacific Public Sector Internet Business Solutions Group

Cisco Systems

Dr Selinger was a classroom teacher and higher education teacher educator. She later directed a research centre for new technology in education at the University of Warwick. She now works as the director for education in Cisco's consultancy group across the Asia Pacific region providing thought leadership around innovation in ICT and education.

Dr Selinger is involved in the World Economic Forum's Global Education Initiative. UNESCO are about to launch a set of ICT teacher training competency standards which she helped to develop. She is an Adjunct Professor in the Faculty of Education and Social Work at the University of Sydney and Honorary Research Associate at Royal Holloway University, London in the ICT4D collective.



Aidan McCarthy Director of Information and Learning Technologies, Scotch College, Perth

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Aidan McCarthy is the Director of Information and Learning Technologies at Scotch College. He began working with Scotch College in November 2007 and, as a member of the College Executive, he is responsible for driving the overall strategic direction of all Information and Learning Technologies throughout the College. Aidan is also engaged in consulting as the Strategic Advisor for NSW Department of Education and Microsoft.
